



The fiscal year department staff consisted of 6 full time members, and 105 part-time members, which included teachers, instructors, camp counselors, seasonal and year round park maintenance and office staff.

We also had the assistance of a Shepherd University intern, volunteers, community service workers and the Job Corps to see community events and park projects come to fruition.

Our team offered 785 programs to the county and managed 400 acres of parkland.









JEFFERSON COUNTY PARKS **URBAN TREE CANOPY ASSESSMENT**



"Cacapon Institute completed an Urban Tree Canopy assessment for all of JCPRC parks that was formally adopted in October 2015 by the JCPRC board. Under the recommendations of JCPRC staff. Cacapon Institute proposed areas for planting landscape trees, creating no-mow reforestation areas, and fostering low-mow grasslands that will help to increase tree canopy and reduce mowing costs. JCPRC's plan to convert landcover within their parks will decrease the amount of greenspace and open areas by 14% (295 acres down to 238 acres). Those 57 acres would be converted to landscape trees (6 acres, 1%), reforestation (40 acres, 10%), and grasslands (11 acres, 3%)."

The Jefferson County Parks & Recreation Commission (JCPRC) is a government agency that's mission is to provide safe public parks and year round recreational activities for the citizens in the Jefferson County community. The JCPRC operates or maintains ten county parks that encompass over 400 acres of park land and a variety of park facilities, including the Jefferson County Community Center, picnic pavilions, walking trails, playgrounds, tennis courts, athletic fields and open space.

The JCPRC was established in 1970 by the Jefferson County Commission and is made up of an eleven member volunteer board that meets once a month at the Jefferson County Community Center. Its board members are appointed by the Jefferson County Commission for two and three-year terms and then may be re-appointed after their term has expired. The JCPRC hired a full-time director in 1994 to run the Parks & Recreation Department and has since steadily grown to include five full-time staff members, two part-time staff members, eight seasonal maintenance staff and numerous other program staff.

The JCPRC main office is located in the Jefferson County Community Center in Sam Michael's Park.
