SKYWARN Storm Spotter Winter Storm Course to be held in Jefferson County on November 15, 2016

Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management has invited the National Weather Service to teach a SKYWARN Storm Spotter Winter Storm course on Tuesday, November 15, 2016 from 6:30-9:30 p.m. The class will be held at the Independent Fire Company, located at 200 West 2nd Avenue, Ranson, WV 25438, please use the West 3rd Avenue entrance of the building. This class is free and open to the public.

The SKYWARN courses are designed to educate the public on weather threats in this area, as well as strengthen the ties between the National Weather Service and the local community. The more spotters the National Weather Service has out there, the faster vital ground truth information gets to the National Weather Service forecasters who make the decisions to issue lifesaving weather warnings.

The Skywarn Winter Storm course provides a more in depth training of winter weather hazards and the role of spotters during these events. The course is intended for everyone above the age of 14, however the Skywarn Basics I is a prerequisite for this course. The winter storm course includes:

Winter weather hazards in the Mid-Atlantic
Formation and development of winter storms
Winter weather statistics
Winter preparation and safety
NWS winter weather products
The role of Skywarn spotter in winter weather

JCHSEM Teaches Harpers Ferry Woman's Group about Preparing for Disasters

The Harpers Ferry Woman's Group and Harpers Ferry Mayor, Greg Vaughn, visited the JCHSEM Offices and met in the County EOC to learn about Disaster Preparedness from the JCHSEM staff on Friday, October 21st. Director, Barbara Miller talked to the group about the various types of risk that we have in the County and about disaster risk reduction/simple mitigation techniques and led a tour of the building. Deputy Director, Steve Allen taught the group how to put together a family disaster supply kit, and Administrative Assistant, Brandon Vallee told them how to sign up for NIXLE Alerts so that they will receive emergency public information such as weather alerts, shelter information, and where water or other supplies might be available during a large disaster.

The river gauge on the Potomac River in Shepherdstown has been replaced after several years of being absent. The gauge will help the weather service to give more accurate forecasts of the Potomac River, helping points downstream from the gauge, including Harpers Ferry, Point of

Rocks, and other communities to the East of Jefferson County.

Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management Reminds Residents about Preparing for Extreme Winter Weather

With the winter season rapidly approaching, Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management (JCHSEM) is encouraging all residents of Jefferson County to be prepared for winter storms and extreme cold.

It is essential to know the terms used to describe changing winter weather conditions as they impact what actions you must to take to stay safe. These terms can be used to determine the timeline and severity of an approaching storm. (Advisory / Watch / Warning). The NWS also issues advisories and warnings for other winter weather, including blizzards, freezes, wind chill, lake effect snow, and dense fog. Be alert to weather reports and tune in for specific guidance when these conditions develop.

Freezing Rain - Rain that freezes when it hits the ground, creating a coating of ice on roads, walkways, trees and power lines.

Sleet - Rain that turns to ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet also causes moisture on roads to freeze and become slippery.

Wind Chill- Wind-chill is the temperature it "feels like" when you are outside. The NWS provides a Wind-chill Chart to show the difference between air temperature and the perceived temperature and the amount of time until frostbite occurs. <u>Winter Weather Advisory</u> - Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and may be hazardous. When caution is used, these situations should not be life threatening. The NWS issues a winter weather advisory when conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences that may be hazardous. If caution is used, these situations should not be life-threatening.

<u>Winter Storm Watch</u> - A winter storm is possible in your area. Tune in to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for more information. The NWS issues a winter storm watch when severe winter conditions, such as heavy snow and/or ice, may affect your area but the location and timing are still uncertain. A winter storm watch is issued 12 to 36 hours in advance of a potential severe storm. Tune in to NOAA Weather Radio, local radio, TV, or other news sources for more information. Monitor alerts, check your emergency supplies, and gather any items you may need if you lose power.

Winter Storm Warning - A winter storm is occurring or will soon occur in your area.

Blizzard Warning - Sustained winds or frequent gusts to 35 miles per hour or greater and considerable amounts of falling or blowing snow (reducing visibility to less than a quarter mile) are expected to prevail for a period of three hours or longer. electricity. Your flashlight and radio should be either hand-cranked or battery-powered, and stored with extra batteries. Your cell phone charger should be hand-crank, solar, or able to be charged from a car outlet.

<u>MEDICAL</u> – Include first aid kit, prescription and non-prescription/over-the-counter medications, and medical supplies. <u>SANITATION</u> – Pack supplies for sanitation, such as hand sanitizer, towelettes, paper products, diapers, and plastic bags, for use when water resources are limited.

<u>ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY</u> – Include battery backup power for power-dependent mobility devices, oxygen, and other assistive technology needs.

EXTRA CLOTHING, BLANKETS, and SLEEPING BAGS – Dress in layers to keep warm if you lose power. Ensure you have enough clothing, hats, mittens, and blankets or sleeping bags for everyone in the house.

<u>ITEMS FOR SNOW AND ICE</u> – Stock up on rock salt to melt ice on walkways or sand or kitty litter to improve traction and snow shovels or other snow removal equipment.

<u>WOOD</u> – Store a supply of dry, seasoned wood if you have a working fireplace or wood-burning stove with a safe flue or vent. Please note that this is a basic list of supplies that should be in your emergency preparedness kit. Your kit should reflect your family's specific needs (such as access and functional needs, pets, or infants). It is also a good idea to prepare your automobile and house for the winter months. Ensure your car is winterized (checking key components, fluids, and safety measures) and has its own emergency preparedness kit. Ensure your home is ready for colder weather by insulating water pipes, cleaning out gutters, maintain heating equipment and chimneys, checking smoke detectors, and insulating walls and attics. Finally, before the snow starts flying, be sure to sign up for Nixle Alerts. Using the Nixle program, Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management is able to send out emergency alert notifications by text, e-mail, Twitter, and Facebook. In order to sign up for these alerts, go to http://local.nixle.com/register or text your Jefferson County zip code to 888777 and then text JCHSEM to the same number. This is a free service.

Mobilizing Faith-Based Community Organizations in Preparedness of Disasters

Date: November 3, 2016 Time: 8am to 5pm

Course Description:

This 8-hour, planning and management-level course trains faith-based community organization (FBCO) representatives, management-level emergency managers, and first responders from small and rural communities to strategically mobilize and engage members of FBCOs, including religious charities, nonprofits such as the Salvation Army, the American Red Cross, churches (both affiliated and unaffiliated), temples, synagogues, mosques, and NGOs etc., in a reciprocal approach to disaster planning that is integrated into current local and statewide emergency management efforts. This course emphasizes grassroots mobilization and coordination efforts as a means of engaging all faith communities, thereby reaching those marginalized communities most vulnerable to disaster, most frequently excluded from the planning process, and ultimately, most difficult to aid in recovery. This course introduces vital emergency management concepts to FBCO leaders, many of whom will have had no prior experience with emergency management and also seek to educate emergency managers and first responders about the critical role FBCOs can play in strengthening preparedness. Sign Up to Receive NIXLE ALERTS!



Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management uses NIXLE

Alerts to send emergency alert notifications by text, e-mail, Facebook and Twitter. We send out weather watches and warnings, as well as Emergency Public Information during disasters. Examples include tornado, flood, severe snowstorm, and severe thunderstorm watches, warnings, advisories, and emergen-

cies, as well as, where emergency shelters are located, where commodities can be obtained, etc. Signing up is easy and its FREE! To sign up, go to

http://local.nixle.com/register or text your zip code to 888777 and then text JCHSEM to the same number.

In addition to NIXLE, we still use traditional media, such as newspapers, TV, and radio, however, receiving NIXLE alerts on your phone is the fastest way to receive emergency public information. Make sure that everyone in your family that has a phone, receives our emergency alerts in case that you are not together when a disaster happens. Make receiving NIXLE Alerts a part of your family's communication plan. If you have questions about NIXLE Alerts, you can go to www.nixle.com and click on "resident". You can always call our office if you have local questions or need assistance with getting registered.

USGS Shepherdstown River Gauge returns to the Potomac River!

Advanced Hydrologic Prediction Service (AHPS) is an essential component of our Climate, Water, and Weather Services. AHPS is a web-based suite of accurate and information-rich forecast products. They display the magnitude and uncertainty of occurrence of floods or droughts, from hours to days and months, in advance. These graphical products are useful information and planning tools for many economic and emergency managers. These products enable government agencies, private institutions, and individuals to make more informed decisions about risk based policies and actions to mitigate the dangers posed by floods and droughts.

The USGS Shepherdstown River Gauge was damaged and removed several years ago, but has now been returned to Potomac River so that forecasters can now make better predictions for interests along the Potomac downstream. "Having the Potomac River gauge live again is great news for our community and for those downstream of Shepherdstown on River Road, in the Glen Haven Community, and Harpers Ferry, as well as

communities in Maryland and Virginia downstream. The USGS gauges are a key component of river forecasting and should help the hydrology forecasters at the National Weather Service to make better predictions for flood watches, warnings, advisories, and emergencies for the Potomac River now and in the future for our residents," said Barb Miller, Jefferson County's Director of Homeland Security and Emergency Management. "For example, if we know that the river is forecasted to go to 15 feet, we know that River Road below Shepherdstown will be fully covered with water, and residents can plan accordingly. Its great to have this resource back in the Potomac!"

The Steering Committee works with the JCHSEM Director to guide the activities of JCHSEM. A fourteen-member Steering Committee is made up of public and private representation. JCHSEM is a Department within the Jefferson County Commission, who has overall responsibility for the department and its employees. The Jefferson County Commission appoints all members to the steering committee. This committee meets on the 4th Tuesday of February. March, May, June, August, September and holds a Nov/Dec meeting at 9:00 a.m. in the JCHSEM EOC at 28 Industrial Blvd., Kearneysville, unless otherwise announced. The Quarterly Partnership meetings held in January, April, July, and October also serve as the Steering Committee meetings for those months.

A Risk Assessment and Mitigation Plan was completed and adopted by the Jefferson County Commission, all Jefferson County municipalities, WVHSEM, and Federal Emergency Management Agency in July, 2003. The plan was updated in 2008 and 2013. The 2013 Plan was approved by WVDHSEM and FEMA in June, 2013.
