

And JCHSEM's New Director is.....



Stephen S. Allen was unanimously appointed Director on January 18, 2018 by the Jefferson County Commission. He previously served as the Deputy Director/Planner/Program Manager for Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management since May of 2016. His accomplishments (beyond the daily operational responsibilities and meetings) since coming to Jefferson County are organizing and updating the Community Rating System list of properties located in floodplains and the distribution of the annual informational letters to the property owners, reviewing our county emergency operations plans prior to acceptance by the county, participating in our community outreach programs, overseeing the technical aspects of retention of hazardous materials site data and reviewing the updated hazardous material commodity flow studies of materials passing through or located in

Jefferson County for the Jefferson County Local Emergency Planning Committee, and actively participating in our disaster exercises to ensure the community is ready for disasters and large-scale emergencies.

Prior to coming to work for Jefferson County, Steve retired as the director of the Berkeley County Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (formerly Office of Emergency Services) after 29 years of service to the people of Berkeley County. He began his emergency management career in 1986. In that position, he coordinated the community's endeavors to provide for the health, safety, and preparedness for threats from numerous types of large-scale emergencies and disasters. He also developed and maintained the county's emergency operations plan for the county and provided guidance and oversaw the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), which is a facility for key officials to operate from during disasters and other large -scale events. Under Mr. Allen's direction, the agency was also responsible for providing mutual aid for fire protection for the county in support of volunteer fire departments.

Mr. Allen organized and led Berkeley County's Hazardous Incident Response Team and was the chairman of the county's Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) for nearly all of its existence.

Before becoming the director of the Berkeley County's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, he enjoyed an extensive background in emergency services starting in 1974, including 12 years as a professional firefighter and EMT in both the private and public sectors as well as Crash/Fire/Rescue at the WV Air National Guard and Fairchild Republic Company in Hagerstown, MD.. He was the Chief for the Bedington Fire and Rescue Department directly before joining Berkeley County government. Mr. Allen is a charter member of the Berkeley County Fire Service Board. He also served as Chairman of the WV Emergency Management Council, and was a Regional Team Leader for the WV Regional Response Team.

Mr. Allen, a Martinsburg, WV native, is also a HazMat Technician and a certified Field Instructor for Regional Educational Service Agency (RESA) VIII and has been an instructor for the West Virginia Fire Service Extension of West Virginia University. He has also served as a State instructor for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) courses at the local level and has extensive on-scene experience and classroom training experience in firefighting, hazardous materials handling and disaster preparedness, response, and recovery. He is a graduate of Martinsburg High School, Martinsburg, WV and has several course credits at Shepherd College.

In Berkeley County, Mr. Allen received numerous awards and recognition for his public service from state and local government, community service agencies and the WV Air National Guard.

Sign Up to Receive Nixle Alerts!



Jefferson County Homeland Security and Emergency Management uses NIXLE
Alerts to send emergency alert notifications by text, e-mail, Facebook and Twitter. We send out weather watches and warnings, as well as Emergency Public Information during disasters. Examples include tornado, flood, severe

snowstorm, and severe thunderstorm watches, warnings, advisories, and emergencies, as well as, where emergency shelters are located, where commodities can be obtained, etc. Signing up is easy and its FREE! To sign up, go to <u>http://local.nixle.com/register</u> or text your zip code to 888777 and then text JCHSEM to the same number.

In addition to NIXLE, we still use traditional media, such as newspapers, TV, and radio, however, receiving NIXLE alerts on your phone is the fastest way to receive emergency public information. Make sure that everyone in your family that has a phone, receives our emergency alerts in case that you are not together when a disaster happens. Make receiving NIXLE Alerts a part of your family's communication plan. If you have questions about NIXLE Alerts, you can go to <u>www.nixle.com</u> and click on "resident". Is your business prepared for an emergency?

We all recognize that disaster can strike anywhere, at any time. However, there is a tendency to believe that "it won't happen to me." Time and time again has shown that it can and will happen. Taking the smallest steps can prepare your self, home, and business for an emergency.

We ask you to consider the following:

- An estimated 25 percent of businesses do not reopen following a major disaster, according to the Institute for Business and Home Safety.
- The number of declared major disasters more than doubled in the 1990s.
- A business can be hurt indirectly when disaster strikes customers or another business, such as a supplier or distributor.
- OSHA requires that most businesses with 10 or more employees have a written emergency plan.
- The realities of a post-9/11 world and an increasing dependency on computer technology call for additional protection of business operations.

Businesses and their staff face a wide variety of hazards in Jefferson County, ranging from natural hazards (flooding/ tornadoes), health hazards (flu pandemics), human caused hazards, and technology related hazards (such as power outages). Planning of a disaster may seem like an overwhelming task, but there are plenty of free resources to help you get started. Need Training?

Emergency Management is a constantly-changing field. While we all strive to keep up with the latest technology, the best ways to work with stakeholders to develop plans, how to conduct successful floodplain management, performing damage assessments, how to handle the debris after a disaster, help our communities to recover, or just learning the fundamentals, there are plenty of options available to you. Here are some great opportunities for training that you may or may not know about:

West Virginia Military Affairs and Public Safety's Training Center, CourseMill. If you are involved in

emergency management in West Virginia, you can set up your free account at http://www.onlinelearning.wv.gov/dmapscm6/home.html Once you set up your account, you can log on and look at the list of available courses being taught in West Virginia. Current courses include the Basics of Floodplain Management, HazMat Highway Containers in a Tunnel Specialist, Search and Rescue in Community Disasters, Disaster Preparedness for Hospitals and HealthCare Organizations within the Community Infrastructure; National Emergency Management Basic Academy Train the Trainer; Advanced Floodplain Management Concepts, and Rail Care Incident Response for Crude, Ethanol and Other Flammable Liquids-Rail Car Response. The courses are always changing, so check back often.

FEMA's Emergency Management Institute's URL is <u>https://training.fema.gov/emi.aspx</u>. From this training portal, anyone can take their online independent study courses for free. There are over 100 courses to choose from. You can also browse the schedules and information about their on-campus resident courses for those who are involved in emergency management at the federal, state, local or tribal governments.

The Steering Committee works with the JCHSEM Director to guide the activities of JCHSEM. A fourteen-member Steering Committee is made up of public and private representation. JCHSEM is a Department within the Jefferson County Commission, who has overall responsibility for the department and its employees. The Jefferson County Commission appoints all members to the steering committee. This committee meets on the 4th Tuesday of February. March, May, June, August, September and holds a Nov/Dec meeting at 9:00 a.m. in the JCHSEM EOC at 28 Industrial Blvd., Kearneysville, unless otherwise announced. The Quarterly Partnership meetings held in January, April, July, and October also serve as the Steering Committee meetings for those months.

Public Awareness, Education and Training Committee, Paula Marrone-Reese, Chair

Any interested person can serve on this committee. The Public Awareness, Education and Training Committee is responsible to communicate the organization's activities to the public and to build support for JCHSEM's programs. They work with the Director and other staff to keep the entire community focused on the objectives of JCHSEM, the opportunities for additional involvement and support by updating citizens and businesses about what the partners are doing and how the community will and is benefiting from these efforts. Additionally, they are responsible to assist the program manager is setting up speaking engagements and public awareness events. This committee meets monthly on the 2nd Wednesday of the at 0830 in the EOC at 28 Industrial Blvd., Kearneysville, unless otherwise announced.

Risk Assessment and Mitigation Planning Committee, Mason Carter, Chair

Any interested person may serve on this committee. The Risk Assessment/Mitigation Planning Committee examine the community's risks and vulnerability to all hazards and assess the community's vulnerability to those risks. A Risk Assessment and Mitigation Plan was completed and adopted by the Jefferson County Commission, all Jefferson County municipalities, WVHSEM, and Federal Emergency Management Agency in July, 2003. The plan was updated in 2008 and 2013. The 2013 Plan was approved by WVDHSEM and FEMA in June, 2013. This committee meets Quarterly, and holds an Annual Meeting to review status of projects that were identified in the plan. Please call the office for exact dates and times.

Counter Terrorism Committee, Stephen Allen, Director, Chair

Membership to this sub-committee of the Risk Assessment and Mitigation Planning Committee is limited to members of law enforcement, emergency management, homeland security, emergency communications, Red Cross, schools, health care, fire companies, ambulance authority/EMS, and government, due to sensitive homeland security issues. The committee works on issues of planning and training for counter terrorism or human-caused disasters. Meetings are held on the 2nd Tuesday of the month at the EOC at 28 Industrial Blvd., Kearneysville, unless otherwise announced.
