EFFECTIVE JULY 3, 2006 -No Records prior to 1853

Records that are older than 50 years are public record.

- 1. Family
 - a. Parent

- e. Grandparents
- b. Adult Children
- f. Grandchildren

- c. Spouse
- d. Brother/Sister
- 2. Ex Spouses' can obtain death record IF they have proof of marriage or shared property, such as a deed or marriage license. If an Ex needs proof for a minor child they must show proof of paternity (birth certificate of child) & their ID. Put in notes what they brought in as proof.
- 3. Legal Representative
 - a. Attorney
 - b. Physician
 - c. Funeral Director
 - d. Insurance Company
 - e. Authorized Agency

IDENTIFICATION REQUIRED FOR OBTAINING DEATH CERTIFCATE

PHOTO ID

- 1. A state issued driver's license or identification card
- 2. US or foreign passport, visa, national identity cards issued by US government to foreign nationals
- 3. Employment photo ID issued by the federal, state or local government, including military or a photo ID card from a government sponsored program (NO business or student ID's)
- 4. Major credit card with a photo of the card holder

NO PHOTO ID AVAILABLE

- 1. Major credit card (must be signed)
- 2. Motor vehicle registration card (must be signed)
- 3. State social services program (must be signed)
- 4. Current utility bill or pay stub (VITAL RECORD WILL BE MAILED TO THE ADDRESS LISTED.)
- 5. If a person requesting a certificate is accompanied by someone who does not have acceptable PHOTO ID, a signature affidavit attesting to the person's identity can be accepted along with a copy of that photo ID.
